Edmonton & Area Land Trust http://www.ealt.ca/volunteer	<p><i>Some of the Current Volunteer Opportunities</i></p> <p><u>Baseline study volunteers:</u> These volunteers would require some knowledge of plants, animals, geology, geography, or land surveying. A small team of people would be required to go out and look at properties of interest to the land trust and do a preliminary report of the site based on the criteria set up by EALT.</p> <p><u>Volunteer Stewards:</u> People interested in monitoring and looking after lands entrusted to the EALT. They would follow the policies set out by the Land Trust for stewarding land. This could include annual monitoring, assistance with a maintenance schedule, helping with work parties, looking after signage or brochures as needed.</p> <p><i>Future Volunteer Opportunities</i></p> <p><u>Work party Volunteers:</u> Persons interested in helping periodically with work parties at sites that the Land Trust is dealing with. FAN belongs to a federation of nature clubs found in different parts of Alberta, if we can't find a volunteer role for you directly with FAN, there may be additional volunteer opportunities through our clubs. Volunteers are often needed to help with tree planting and reseeding of the riparian zones, assisting landowners in making modifications to their livestock management strategies and assessing water quality and fish populations. (All projects are reviewed by a qualified biologist before their implementation.) <p>Volunteer Steward Program</p> <p>http://tpr.alberta.ca/parks/volunteer/stewards/default.aspx</p>	<p><u>Volunteer Stewards</u></p> <p>There are two ways to become involved in volunteer stewardship: as a roving steward or as a steward assigned to one or more sites. Volunteer stewards help us monitor conditions at select parks and protected areas, many of which are remote or undeveloped. Roving stewards are not assigned to a specific site, but are free to move from site to site and take on special projects that are short or long in duration. Stewards assigned to sites are required to visit their assigned site(s) at least twice per year to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • observe, record and report on natural conditions and human activities, including any site destruction or alteration, and unauthorized activities; • install and maintain signs along the site boundary, where applicable; and • complete and submit site-inspection forms, which the department uses to update its site database. 	<p>email Coral Grove, the Volunteer Steward Coordinator at Parks Volunteer (Parks.volunteer@gov.ab.ca).</p>
